November's Registrar Advisory Group (RAG) meeting

On November 13 the Registrar Advisory Group (RAG) met to discuss .nz registrations at the second level, hear updates from NZRS and DNCL, and consider issues dealing with DNSSEC implementation.

The RAG consists of six Registrar representatives, the Domain Name Commissioner and the Chief Executive of NZRS.

RAG's Registrar representatives currently include: Mark Goldfinch (Modica Group), Kim Lowton (Netregistry Group), Quintin Russ (SiteHost) Lee Miller (Net24 Group), Maria Brosnan (Freeparking/WebFarm) and Glen Eustace (GodZone Internet Services).

Josh Cookson, who is responsible for DNCL's Registrar Liaison and Compliance, said the RAG meetings are a productive way to see issues from all perspectives and to try and find solutions that work for Registrars.



NZRS and DNCL representatives attend ICANN meeting in Argentina

The first .nz Registrar Conference a success

On November 14 the first .nz Registrar Conference was held, an event that is expected to become an annual one.

The conference played host to a wide variety of speakers on topics such .nz domain name insights, updates on DNCL policy and how Registrars can go about implementing DNSSEC.

NZRS's David Morrison, who organised the conference, said he had received a lot of great positive feedback and was looking forward to seeing even more Registrars attend in 2014.





Radio New Zealand website deploys DNSSEC

This month Radio New Zealand adopted DNSSEC for their public domains, a move that will make their website more secure overall.

Radio New Zealand's New Media Manager Richard Hulse said that the organisation had made the decision because it was considered best practice.

"I think that Government organisations, particularly those with public-facing websites, should be the leaders in embracing online best practice, especially where security is concerned." he said.

"We changed registrars in order to adopt DNSSEC, and they made it trivial for us to implement."

"If it is this simple, it's inevitable that it will become the norm."

DNCL acknowledges all domain name Registrars who are making efforts to make the DNS become more secure. Godzone and Metaname are already completely DNSSEC-friendly and recently Gandi, Catalyst and Key Systems have officially met the criteria to be able to handle Delegation Signer (DS) records. A number of other Registrars are at various stages in their DNSSEC projects.

DNCL currently gives Registrars two levels of DNSSEC compliance: being able to handle Delegation Signer records or be fully DNSSEC-friendly, a status that requires them to meet four levels of additional criteria. Delegation Signer records provide information about a signed domain and is a significant step towards being completely DNSSEC-friendly.

Registrars holding the DNSSEC friendly status are able to offer their customers the ability to have signed domains, a step forward towards more secure domain names.

Browsers offer the possibility of visual hints of DNSSEC usage in domains by using third-party tools, such as the key logo displayed in the image below. Those visual signals will become normal practice in the near future.



FAQ – Allowing registrations directly at the second level

Following on from the recent announcement that .nz domain names will be allowed to be registered directly at the second level, DNCL has created a FAQ sheet for those who want more information. This FAQ is available at http://dnc.org.nz/faq-registrations-directly-second-level

A final policy implementing the proposal will be subject to public consultation.
